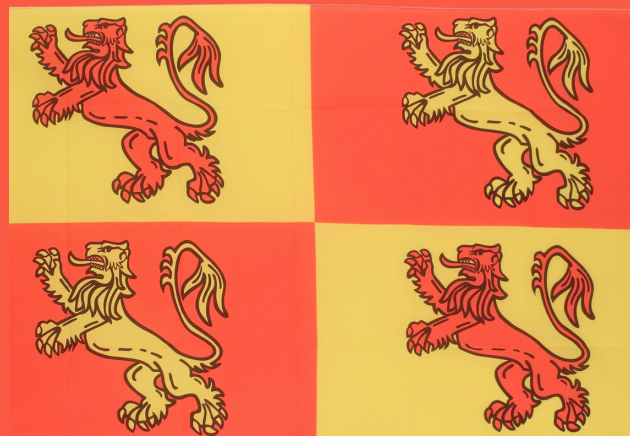

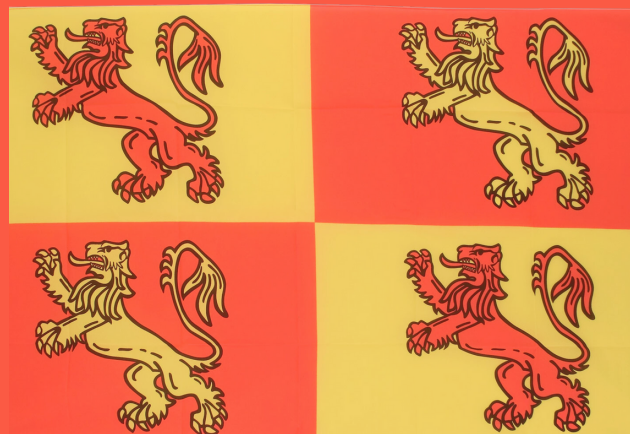

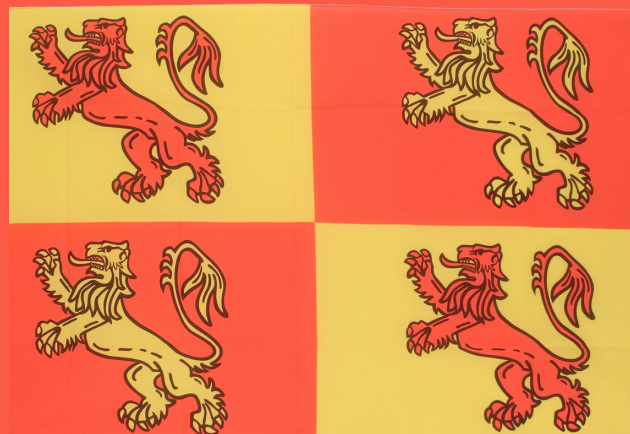
Alexander James Kirkwood (Sandy)

Qualifying as an industrial Organic Chemist, the majority of Sandy's business life was spent in the marine coating industry, initially working for International Paint which subsequently became Courtaulds Coatings, and latterly AkzoNobel.

His business life began in the late 1970s as a paint inspector crawling around various dry dockings and new building yards around the world, providing the opportunity to progress through the ranks to become the senior director for all technical and commercial operations.

After spending many years living in Greece, Korea, Hong Kong, and mainland China Sandy returned to the UK to take up a board position with Akzo Nobel's resin division.
